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CHICAGO POLICE MARINE & HELICOPTER UNIT

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The Chicago Police Marine Unit is winding down after a busy 2017 boating season. In addition to its normal tasks of conducting Homeland Security checks, overseeing the Chicago Air and Water Show, weekly Navy Pier fireworks shows and Chicago Scene Party, the Unit's personnel responded to numerous requests for help both emergency and routine in nature.

A brief overview of the units year round area(s) of responsibilities are to patrol and oversee all bodies of water within the City of Chicago, including 80 square miles of Lake Michigan, several miles of the Lake Michigan shore line, the Chicago River system, Wolf Lake, Lake Calumet and various ponds and lagoons throughout the City. The City of Chicago is home to the largest municipal harbor system in the United States. The unit and its personnel are ready to respond via land or water to surrounding jurisdictions as needs dictate.

The Chicago Police Marine Unit Officers are trained in Underwater Ordnance Detection and Hull and Pier Search Techniques. The unit has Side Scan Sonar systems to enhance their search and detection capabilities.


Marine Unit Officers are responsible for responding to any criminal incident, within the Port of Chicago waterway system and as such, are charged with enforcing laws and the protection of persons within that system.

The Chicago Police Marine Unit's personnel continually train to refine their capability to respond to and mitigate simultaneous critical incidents. Metropolitan Chicago's profile as an international destination, transportation and commerce hub, and a population center of over 9.8 million residents, including the personal home of the former President of The United States, unfortunately makes it a target-rich environment

for terrorist attacks.

As always, the Chicago Police Marine Unit remains ready to respond to the next call for service regardless of its nature. As all boaters enjoy the wonderful waterways of Chicago, we again stress the importance of boater safety. Experienced boaters, both commercial and recreational, unanimously understand their limitations. Lake Michigan, while offering a wonderful summer playground, can also turn violent with little or no notice. It should always be respected. Personal flotation devices save lives!

The Helicopter Unit is a joint task force consisting of the Chicago Police Department and the Cook County Sheriff's Police Department Members. The Helicopter Operation supports the Patrol Divisions and specialized units of every police agency within Cook County. They are operational 7 days a week. The Helicopter Operation provides an aerial platform to assist ground units with routine patrol, SWAT support, searches, surveillance, dignitary protection, major events and search and rescue missions.



CHICAGO FIRE MARINE & DIVE OPERATIONS

This year the Chicago Fire Marine & Dive Operations put a new fire boat into service. Its mission is to handle fire suppression, search and rescue as well as EMS missions. FastBoat 6-8-8 is a custom built Boston Whaler 350 Challanger model Fireboat, built by Brunswick Commercial & Government Products. FastBoat 6-8-8 is thirty-five feet in length, powered by triple 300 HP Mercury Verando Engines. This gives it a top speed of 50 MPH.

6-8-8 is equipped with a 135 HP pump, capable of pumping 1150 gallons of water per minute through its three discharge ports and deck gun for firefighting operations.

The boat was designed with a removable dive door on the port side. This is for dive operations and allows for deployment of divers and fast recovery of victims and rescue personnel.

6-8-8 has a draft of only twenty-two inches which allows it to get into almost any location along the shoreline.

The boat is licensed by the Illinois Department of Public health as a Basic Life Support vessel, allowing us to carry lifesaving equipment and Emergency Medical Technicians to provide immediate patient care, while transport is made to our shoreline.

6-8-8 is manned by one Officer, one Engineer and two Firefighter/Public Safety Divers. This new boat helps the Chicago Fire Department live up to its motto "WE'RE THERE WHEN YOU NEED US". They can be contacted directly on Channel 16 for emergencies.

ACTIVATE THE DISTRESS BUTTON TO ACHIEVE THE FULL FUNCTIONALITY OF YOUR DSC RADIO!

DSC (Digital Selective Calling) has been phasedin to VHF marine radios as a required component since 1999. Approximately five (5) years ago, DSC functionality, through the US Coast Guard's Rescue21 system, became operational on the Great Lakes. Today, DSC radios enjoy wide-spread use, however many radio users do not benefit from the DSC safety features, as the DSC functionality must be activated by the owner. These features, including the Distress

Button, typically do not function out of the box!

DSC radios can usually be spotted by the red "Distress" button, typically found on the main console or on the back of the microphone. When the Distress feature is activated, the

DSC marine radio will send a digital distress call, and every DSC-capable radio receiving and acknowledging the alert will automatically switch to channel 16 to hear the distress message. Radios integrated with GPS receivers will also encode the senders' GPS coordinates with the distress message, enabling a swift rescue in urgent situations where there may not be enough time to communicate verbally.

In Chicago, we enjoy extensive coverage over the south end of Lake Michigan through the US Coast Guard Rescue21 radio towers (see coverage map). These towers receive DSC radio transmissions and distress calls, relaying them instantly to Coast Guard responders. Unfortunately, most boaters in Chicago have not activated the DSC functionality on their radios, and won't benefit from wide-spread notification of fellow boaters and accurate communication with the Coast Guard! The fix is simple – and FREE. To activate the full features of the DSC radio, three simple steps are required:

REGISTER for a free MMSI number PROGRAM the MMSI into the radio CONNECT A GPS to the radio (optional)

Once the MMSI is programmed into the radio, the Distress button and core DSC features will function

> If your radio has a MMSI previously programmed, most radios will flash the MMSI on the display as it is turned on. The manufacturer's instructions will also direct as to how to check the programming.

> To register for a free MMSI, Chicagoland boaters are encouraged to register with Boat US at https://www.boatus. com/mmsi/ (Several entities can provide MMSI numbers, but Boat US offers greater ease of

maintenance of the registration information in the future.) Instructions on programming the MMSI and making GPS connections can be found in the radio manufacturer's instructions. 

U.S. COAST GUARD NOTICE

PASSENGERS AND OPERATORS OF UNINSPECTED PASSENGER VESSELS (CHARTER VESSELS)

Ensure you know the status of the operator and vessel you plan on going out on before you or your family get underway! Ask to the see the operator's U. S. Coast Guard issued Merchant Mariner Credential and documentation demonstrating enrollment in a Drug & Alcohol Program that meets the requirements of 46 CFR Part 16 and 33 CFR Part 95.

WHAT IS AN UNINSPECTED PASSENGER VESSEL (UPV)? Per 46 US Code 2101:

AN UNINSPECTED VESSEL OF LESS THAN 100 GROSS TONS (100 GT): Carrying not more than six (6) passengers, including at least one "passenger for hire"; or a vessel that is chartered with the crew provided or specified by the owner or the owner's representative and carrying not more than six (6) passengers. OR

AN UNINSPECTED VESSEL OF AT LEAST 100 GROSS TONS (100 GT) BUT NOT MORE THAN 300 GROSS TONS (300 GT): Carrying not more than twelve (12) passengers, including at least one "passenger for hire", or a vessel that is chartered with the crew provided or specified by the owner's representative and carrying not more than twelve (12) passengers.

Passenger means an individual carried on a vessel except those detailed in 46 USC 2101(21). The following persons are not considered passengers: the owner, operator, master or crew members.

Passenger for Hire means a passenger for whom consideration is contributed as a condition of carriage on the vessel, whether directly or indirectly flowing to the owner, charterer, operator, agent or any other person having an interest in the vessel.

NOTE: Vessels carrying passengers in excess of the allowed numbers indicated above are required to be inspected by the U.S. Coast Guard. They are required to have a Certificate of Inspection issued by the U.S. Coast Guard posted in a public space on the vessel, in addition to the credentialing and Drug & Alcohol Program requirements indicated above.

Operators of Self-Propelled Uninspected passenger vessels are required to have in their possession, while operating, a valid Coast Guard issued Merchant Mariner Credential endorsed for the vessel type and operation (46 CFR Part 15.605). Failure to comply with this provision could result in civil penalties of up to \$35,000.

Operators must also carry documentation demonstrating compliance of all crewmembers in a Drug & Alcohol Program (46 CFR Part 16). Failure to comply with this provision could result in civil penalties of up to \$7,000.

THE CHICAGO HARBOR SAFETY COMMITTEE CONCLUDES A BIG 2017 SEASON

The Chicago Harbor Safety Committee (CHSC), as you will recall from last year's Yachting in Chicago, was established in 2013 to have the private sector and government agencies cooperate and communicate to improve the safe and efficient use of Chicago waterways, including the Chicago River and Lake Michigan. In the intervening several years the cooperation between private sector groups brought tremendous improvements in their on the water practices and publication of guidelines, particularly for operations on the crowded Chicago River. Leadership by Mike Borgstrom of Wendella set a high standard for communication and safety. A regular forum is provided for proponents of onwater events, the Coast Guard, law enforcement, city administration and other participants to let each other know what is going on while hearing about potential issues from respective perspectives to iron out problems in advance. This year brought more information to the public and transition to new administration.

Honorable Mention

The National Transportation Safety Board adopted, January 25, 2017, a report entitled Shared Waterways Shared Waterways: Safety of Recreational and Commercial Vessels in the Marine Transportation System which, while national in scope, specifically described the positive action of CHSC and appended the CHSC Safety Guidelines as an example of best practices.

Safety Video

With the goal of improving safety throughout the Chicago harbor system in mind CHSC set out to create a video particularly addressing skills and "local knowledge" that would promote safety among boaters. A challenge was to develop a presentation that had important information but conveyed it in such an interesting, indeed entertaining, fashion, that people would want to watch it. The video does not replace education, but is a masterful balance of conveying important information - Lock operations, whistle signals, Dime Pier, shoals and others - while including high quality imagery, project took a long time to script, shoot, edit and release and the thirty minute end result is worth your attention. Expenses were under-Foundation, Entertainment Cruises, Wendella, Chicago's First Lady, Shoreline Sightseeing and Marwedel Minichello & Reeb. The video is viewable online at the CHSC website, has been broadcast on WYCC and anyone interested in boats or Chicago should love it.

Illegal Charter Enforcement

The dialog between CHSC members and the Coast Guard, Illinois Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and Chicago Police Marine & Helicopter Unit facilitated by CHSC's meeting environment has brought information to the law enforcement agencies regarding apparent illegal charters. Anecdotes include the middle aged skippers hosting a dozen twentysomethings and when asked if they are running a cruise for hire say "those are all my friends." When passing through the locks and being told that private boats require lifejackets for everyone aboard, the Lockmaster is told "we are a charter" (commercial vessels being exempted). Vessels with paying passengers require a Coast Guard licensed Captain. Vessels for with more than six paying passengers must be Coast Guard inspected. With the rise in "Uber for boats" websites, illegal charters appear to proliferate. Through the communication fostered in part by CHSC the Coast Guard and Illinois DNR ran a two week enforcement operation issuing twenty two citations and imposing more than fifty thousand dollars in fines. This was not a surprise, however. The Coast Guard Marine Safety Unit (MSU) and CHSC hosted, courtesy of Chicago Yacht Club, a seminar in April, 2017 on proper operation of Uninspected Passenger Vessels. The operation was announced ahead of time .

New President

CHSC was created from perceptions in the marine community that, particularly as usage of the Chicago River expanded, the different sectors of commercial vessels, passenger vessels, bareboat charters, recreational vessels and human powered craft including kayaks and racing shells, needed to know more about each other, including the procedures and limitations of vessels and operators. The achievements described above convey how well everyone has learned to work and play together. CHSC was lead, since its inception, by Mike Borgstrom, a third generation Captain and tour boat and water taxi operator. In 2017, Mike decided to step aside. The new President of CHSC is James Morro, of Urban Kayaks. The fact that there is mutual respect between leaders in these two sectors may be the biggest indicator of the success of CHSC.

RAISE YOUR BRIDGE GAME!

Chicago is a dynamic ever-changing city with a rich history closely tied to the Lake, its rivers and canals. Yet, the bridges crossing our waterways are often over looked and taken for granted unless up for repair or viewed on a river run. Most boaters know of the bridges, yet how much deeper have we looked at these magnificent structures – beyond their dance of conveyance and obstruction between Lake Michigan and winter storage?

After presenting at a CYA meeting this Spring it was suggested a wider CYA audience might appreciate a taste of Chicago's rich bridge history. So here are some fun facts to raise your knowledge of our wonderful bridges:

Chicago is known as the Drawbridge Capital of the World - not because it has the most drawbridges, Amsterdam does, but the Second City is next in line world-wide. Yet, Chicago has long been known in engineering and architectural circles as the Drawbridge Capital of the World for the number, innovation, and developments in moveable bridge design and construction that occurred here. As a center for modern drawbridge design, invention, and experimentation Chicagoan's hold more drawbridge patents than any other city, and we the most different moveable bridge designs of any city. These milestones speak to our role, particularly during the early 20th Century, for inventing and trying the newest drawbridge designs before anywhere else on earth.

Most of Chicago's bridges are bascule bridges - as bascule is a French word meaning seesaw (or teeter-totter) describing how these bridges work. Each leaf (of the single or double-leaf) bridge is balanced at or very near the pivot point with a long arm, reaching over the waterway, and a short arm at the approach holding a counterweight, usually beneath the roadway. These leaves rotate on a trunnion (or axle) attached to each side of the leaf superstructure at the point of rotation. These trunnions, typically a large stainless-steel cylinder, are held by large bearing, which connects and supports each side of the bridge to the foundation. A pit below the counterweight allows the bridge to tip vertically and rotate on the trunnion to open and close. Almost perfectly balanced a small electric motor is all that is required to open and close even a many thousand-ton bridge. Today's bridges operate using 60 to 110 horsepower motors which are about the same power as the engine in a VW Beatle. To ensure the smooth and reliable operation the City will re-calibrate the counterweights after modifications, maintenance, or even re-painting to ensure they stay in balance. Amazingly even something as innoxious as paint can add several hundred pounds to the weight of a bridge.

The Chicago-type bascules were first designed by City of Chicago Engineers in 1900 – and the first ever Chicago-type opened to traffic at Cortland Street in July of 1902. Although now treated as a fixed span the Cortland Street Bridge is still in use today and received Chicago Landmark status in July of 1997. It is the best remaining example of a first-generation Chicago-type bascule bridge and was modeled after the Tower Bridge in London, England, the world's most famous bascule bridge. Chicago initially claiming having built the first fixedtrunnion bascule bridge in North America we were soon corrected by Milwaukee which had beat us to the punch having completed the first Milwaukee-style, fixed trunnion bascule bridge at Grand Avenue in March of 1902.



Columbus Drive Bridge

The Columbus Drive Bridge is the world's seventh longest bascule bridge –built in 1982, it is the best example of the city's three modern Chicago-type, bascule bridges. The Columbus Drive Bridge was constructed using eight steel box-girders, four on each leaf, to support the bridge deck to eliminate the tens of thousands of rivets necessary on earlier bridges. The welded box-girders were fabricated in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania and floated by barge into the Chicago River and incorporated into the bridge. Constructed in the upright position



so as not to interfere with navigational rights, it successfully raised the level of precision and fit allowing just two points of adjustment. For when the two leaves were lowered together for the first time this massive structure carrying six-lanes of traffic was off by less than an inch or just 3 cm. An impressive coordination of engineering, design, and construction! Chicago hosts two additional modern **Chicago-type** automobile traffic on the lower level in the early 1980's with the project ot eliminate of the dangerous S-curve in Lake Shore Drive. **Built in 1920 the Michigan Avenue Bridge is the most ornamented bridge in Chicago and features a Beaux Arts architectural style.** The key link between the north and south sides, it led to the development of North Michigan Avenue and by late 1940s had earned the moniker "The

of which fourteen where for his bridge designs. Strauss is best known as the chief bridge engineer of the Golden Gate Bridge in San Francisco. What few people realize is he also designed the now iconic, one-hundred year old railroad bridge that stands up in the air near **Kinzie Street**, that is sometimes referred to as the "Viagra" bridge.





bascule bridges at Randolph (1986) and Loomis Street (1978).

The Michigan Avenue Bridge is actually two parallel bridges divisible down the center – it is one of four double-deck, double-leaf bridges in Chicago, but the only one designed for automobiles on both levels. Both Wells Street and Lake Street carry 'L'-trains on the upper and automobiles on the lower levels, while the Lake Shore Drive Bridge was originally designed to carry trains on its lower deck. Never used for this purpose it added Magnificent Mile" and had supplanted State Street as the main shopping and commercial street in Chicago.

Jackson Boulevard and Lake Shore Drive Bridges are Strauss bascule bridges – while most other bridges in the Windy City are Chicago-type bascules these are patented bridge designs. Joseph B. Strauss who was born and trained as an engineer in Cincinnati, Ohio, moved to Chicago, and soon established offices in the famous Monadnock Building. It was there that he received twenty-four U.S. patents,

CYA BOAT OF THE YEAR **ESPRIT D' ÉCOSSE**

The competition was fierce in this 3rd year of the CYA Boat of the Year Award, but **Ross and Judith McLean** were clear winners with their boat, Esprit d' Écosse, a J105. Ross and Judith grew up on the west coast of Scotland where navigation was part of their high school curriculum. Ross got his sea legs early as his father was a commercial fisherman. He is very used to the water. While Judith's family enjoyed some boating experiences together, her sailing training was with the Campbeltown Sailing Club during high school. Ross and Judith met and started dating in high school, married in 1988, and moved to Chicago in 1990.

Once Judith and Ross settled in Chicago, they pursued careers and started a family. When tragedy struck with the death of their son Euan in 2009, they got back into sailing as a positive elixir following such a devastating loss. They started sailing 420 dinghies at first but decided quickly that all the capsizing wasn't for them. In 2010 they joined 3rd Coast Cruising in DuSable Harbor to learn more about keelboat sailing with the idea of buying a boat to race. They met friends at 3rd Coast who ultimately joined them to form the core of their current race team. They are the crew and supporting players on Esprit d' Écosse and directly responsible for the Boat of the Year award; they are: Christina Rice, Katye Michaud, Anne Michaud, and Donald Hansen. It is interesting to note that there are often more women onboard than men, making the Esprit d' Écosse crew highly unusual in the boating community.

The McLeans' first boat was Irish Rover, an Ericson Ron Holland 36 design. Judith said of Irish Rover, "She was a great racing cruiser, however, our first year learning to race was

rocky to say the least, with many last place finishes. After the first season, with help from our friends, we painted her white (she was originally green and adorned with 6 shamrocks), mainly so no one would recognize us. Eventually, in our second year of racing we ended up with some success." That was 5 years ago.

Upon deciding they wanted a faster boat, they joined the J-boat family. Ross came up with the name Esprit d' Écosse. "In Scotland it is common to use Écosse (French for Scotland), and the J105 is a sprit boat. It seemed like a great tie in with 'Esprit.' Little did we know that here in the US not too many people recognize Écosse and we have subsequently had to explain the origin and help with the pronunciation which is Es-spree d-coss. Plus, having already explained for our first boat named Irish Rover that we were Scottish, now we must explain why we have a boat with a French name meaning Spirit of Scotland. It has been quite a journey to say the least."

Ross continued, "Esprit d'Écosse is a fast boat which we initially made go slow. We're still working on the faster part. We raced in our first Mac in 2014 about 5 weeks after we launched Esprit d'Écosse, and we have averaged about 60 races every year since then including MORF, J105 races, the Mac, NOODS, Bi-State and Colors, among others. In the offseasons, we have traveled to San Diego and raced with J World along with friends and fellow crew members Katye Michaud and Christina Rice and have raced in the Caribbean 600 and Conch Republic (Key West to Varadera and Havana, Cuba, and back) with Christina and friends. Our non-

Chicago racing goals are to race in the 'Fastnet' and 'Sydney to Hobart' races. We are all constantly trying to figure out how to best race the J105, which has been described as an easy boat to sail, but a hard boat to sail consistently fast especially in light winds with its one-design class small headsail."

Both Judith and Ross are extremely excited to have had such a successful season this year but feel the need to keep improving with racing. The racing fleets in Chicago - MORF, J105 Fleet 5, Area III and CASRA - are very competitive and all have excellent sailors. "We are honored to be selected as the CYA Boat of the Year, but we know that we still must keep improving to be competitive. Every time we sail and race we seem to learn something new, and this constant learning and improving is for us part of the enjoyment of sail boat racing."

WALTER "GIBBY" VARTAN

A tireless advocate for the Yachting community and nautical arts, we have selected Walter "Gibby" Vartan as Yachtsman of the Year.

Having retired from the United States Air Force as a pilot and Brigadier General, and from Lake Shore Graphics as Chief Executive Officer, he volunteers his time and leadership talents to Chicago area organizations. Gibby served the Chicago Yachting Association as a yacht club representative and then as a flag officer for 20 years. He was Commodore of CYA in 2014.

When did you begin boating and what was your experience?

"I first got interested in boating in the 1950s with my friend, Fred Gorr and his family. Having four young daughters, it seemed that boating would be a great family summer activity. I started with a 1938 Huckins wooden hulled cruiser, followed by a 37-foot aluminum Striker, happily saying good bye to the vagaries of wooden hulls. My final boat, a 54-foot Striker, sportfish capped nearly 60 years of boating. In the early years there was extensive cruising; I was even active for a while as a predicted log competitor. As with many boaters, there were birthday, 4th of July, and other numerous gatherings of friends and family held on the boat. I was honored to show off the Chicago water front by hosting national and international dignitaries for lake cruises, including the Assistant Secretary of Defense; Secretary of the Air Force, the Chief of Staff of the Air Force; and high ranking English and Belgian officers."

When you were Commodore of the Chicago Yacht Club (CYC), what community lakefront and boating improvements did you spearhead?

"In the late 90s while Rear Commodore, I worked with Scott Stevenson the new Director of Westrec Marinas Management to build a multi-use building that housed the Monroe Harbor shuttle office, Harbor Master's office and both boater and public rest rooms. It was a joint effort of CYC and the Park District. A few years later when I was Commodore, I worked closely with Scott Stevenson to begin the lengthy process of redesigning the South End of Belmont Harbor and the movement of the CYC barge. This was a major improvement for boaters and the public, adding slips and eliminating the terrible traffic congestion at the Belmont ramp of Lake Shore Drive."

Under your ten-year leadership as President of the Chicago Yacht Club Foundation (CYCF), what activities did the organization begin?

"Mainly we began a revitalization of the existing Foundation. There was a realization that the yachting community should be giving back to the community in return for the position and prestige enjoyed by its lakeside yacht



clubs and marinas. In a commitment to that idea, I accepted the Presidency of the CYCF and worked hard for the next ten years to fulfill that goal. The majority of the programs are focused on exposing youth to the nautical arts and various civic projects that matched the mission statement. These various programs were and still are carried out by a dedicated group of trustees. It was hoped that this example would be emulated to some extent by other yachting organizations. Examples of the programs are: support of the Sea Scouts, working with the Rickover Junior Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps to create a sail racing team, providing grants for deserving junior sailors to attend clinics and regattas, presenting nautical educational programs to Chicago Public School students, and providing a tall ship experience for young women to build confidence and sailing experience. There is a STEM component as well. On the civic side we support the USCG Foundation, Judd Goldman Foundation, Christmas Tree Ship, Chicago Maritime Museum, US Sailing Foundation, and the Chicago Maritime Festival."

I understand you promote yachting interests in other ways in Chicago?

"I serve on the City of Chicago and IDOT North Lake Shore Drive Task Force, which is charged with a broad mandate to improve the north outer drive. There are many constituencies that have widely divergent views on what LSD should be. Some of those views may have an impact on the access of boaters to their clubs and marinas. This is a long term project, and I participated to represent the yachting community who needed its views included in the planning. This goes into the 2020s."

Living close to downtown Chicago, Gibby and his wife Jane spend most of their social and volunteer life on matters maritime.





On Saturday, September 9th, Chicago Yacht Club hosted its Chicago Regatta, presented by Wintrust and benefitting three different child-focused charities – the University of Chicago Comer Children's Hospital, SOS Villages Illinois, and the Chicago Yacht Club Foundation.

This year's Chicago Regatta included a total of five different events, all running at the same time: a buoy race for one-design boats; a 17 mile distance race for offshore boats; an eight-mile casual race for newer racers; a poker run designed especially for power boats; and a multi-race regatta featuring the exciting M-32 catamarans.

More than 80 boats participated in the event, enjoying sunny skies, spectacular lakefront views, and a steady southeast breeze off Chicago's lakefront. After the conclusion of the on-water events, boaters returned to Chicago Yacht Club's Monroe Station for a blues-themes "Sweet Home Chicago" Dock Party, featuring fantastic blues music from Brian Lupo and the Sam Cockrell Band. The Chicago Yacht Club hosted a silent auction to raise funds for the three Chicago Regatta charities, and auction winners walked away with some spectacular prizes, including everything from coaching session with world-class sailors to ride-alongs on M-32 catamarans.

The three overall winners of the Chicago Regatta will have their names inscribed on the Chicago Regatta Trophy, presented by the Pinnacle Foundation. **Overall winners were:**

- Brass Monkey, owned by Mike Frerker (buoy race overall winner)
- Defiance, owned by Dale Smirl (distance race overall winner)
- Hedgehog, owned by Alec Cutler (M-32 race overall winner)



Other division winners included Branta, owned by Richard Jardine, and La Tigre Rinata, owned by Yaman Battikhi, which won the casual race spinnaker and non-spinnaker divisions, respectively. The Chicago Regatta's Poker Run, jointly sponsored by Chicago Yacht Club and Burnham Park Yacht Club, attracted more than 50 participants. The winner of the poker run was Mirage, owned by Bob Connard who rode in it.

The Chicago Regatta gave the Chicago boating community a chance to get together for a great time, and also raised more than \$80,000 for the three Chicago Regatta charities. "The Chicago Regatta has turned out to be a smashing success. We've had a lot of fun and a lot of people participated," said Chicago Yacht Club Foundation President, CYC Past Commodore Jerry Bober. "We are so happy that we are raising money not only for our foundation but for two other worthy charities here in Chicago." Mollie Kolosky, of Comer Children's Hospital added that "[w] e are so grateful to participate in the Chicago Regatta this year. Funds that have been generously donated to us will go to advancing treatment, research, and patient care." And Anne Glazer, of SOS Villages Illinois, noted that "[a]ll of the funds raised, that go to SOS today will support children in foster care, keep brothers and sisters together, and help families heal."

The Chicago Regatta was made possible by the generous support of Wintrust, its Presenting Sponsor, as well as support from the Pinnacle Foundation and the Chicago Match Race Center. Plans are already in the works for an even bigger and better Chicago Regatta in 2018!

CHICAGO AREA SAIL RACING ASSOCIATION ONE SEASON IN

Created in October 2016 with the goal to improve and grow sail racing on the Chicago waterfront, the question is how is Chicago Area Sail Racing Association (CASRA) doing.

The answer, of course, will be determined solely by the constituents whom CASRA was formed to serve: specifically the owners and crew of racing sailboats, the numerous fleets that compete in the events, and the yacht clubs that organize the regattas.

Stepping back to a time prior to CASRA is important in order to understand the key drivers in its creation. By any measure, sailing yacht racing participation levels had been declining for years as both national level organizations such as US Sailing, and local level organizations such as Lake Michigan Sail Racing Federation, will attest to. The "Fun Factor" was diminishing. Seasoned racers sought greater variety in terms of formats and courses. Less experienced racers desired events that were more reflective of their current capabilities, yet provided opportunities to grow their knowledge. Streamlining and reducing the complexities of getting a boat to the starting line was also a strong request. In essence, CASRA was created to address these issues and grow participation, improve overall enjoyment, reduce complexities, and attract new owners and crew to racing on the shores of Chicago.

With conceptual discussions having begun late 2015, the interest level of the current yacht clubs comprising CASRA progressed rapidly. On November 8, 2016, the Commodores of five yacht clubs (Burnham Park Yacht Club, Chicago Yacht Club, Chicago Corinthian Yacht Club, Columbia Yacht Club, and Jackson Park Yacht Club) announced the creation of CASRA with the statement below. This first year has seen significant levels of activity, improvements and programs, including, but not limited to: a December, 2016 survey seeking input from all racers; a 2016 meeting with all One Design Fleets leaders seeking their input; a 2016 Town Hall Meeting for all racers that reviewed the survey results; and a more balanced 2017 race schedule. Also in the works: the creation of a new Casual Series offering more relaxed racing and starting procedure; a new entry portal reducing complexities to enter regattas; bi-weekly e-blasts to racers; sponsors coming on board to support CASRA and racers; increased collaboration by and among the five yacht clubs; and the creation of the first annual Chicago Junior Race Week. The creation of a CASRA website, Facebook page, Twitter feed, and Instagram page will help keep sailors informed. Yet to come this year is the End Of Season Celebration hosted by CASRA on November 10, 2017 held at Columbia Yacht Club.

As the 2017 season comes to close, racing participation levels are up. Improvements have been made. However, there's still much more to be done, and plans for 2018 are currently being discussed within CASRA and the five yacht clubs that comprise the association.

CASRA will serve as a forum to promote, grow, and foster sailboat racing in Chicago. Our community is unique in many respects and our five clubs are best positioned to take on this task. We strongly believe increased collaboration will lead to better events and increased participation in sailboat racing activities on the Chicago lakefront. Together, we intend to reduce barriers to participation, improve access to racing events, and support beginning sailors to grow our sport in Chicago. New events, race formats and destinations will be developed, including programs to include junior sailing and power boating.

TEAM MEAT WINS NATIONAL OFFSHORE CHAMPIONSHIP

I've often wondered how well we T10 sailors would fare in another boat, in another venue, or against different competition. It was truly an honor when US Sailing invited Team Meat to take a shot at answering all three of those questions. What a pleasant surprise to return home to Chicago Corinthian Yacht Club as National Offshore Champions!

The US Sailing National Offshore Championship is held every two years. For 2017, the regatta was held September 21-24. Ten teams from around the country compete for the Lloyd Phoenix trophy. US Sailing attempts to select a top team from nine different sailing areas, based upon the recommendation of the regional sailing authority or a sailing resume review, plus a team of Midshipmen from the US Naval Academy.

Team Meat applied and, in a moment of questionable judgment by US Sailing, was invited to represent "Area K," which includes Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, North Dakota, South Dakota, Missouri, Western Michigan, and Northwest Indiana. Other skippers included Dan McGanty. a Tartan 101 sailor from Pacific Palisades. CA: Edgar Smith, a Frers 33 sailor from New Haven. CT; Scott Ward, a Beneteau First 50 sailor from Hollywood, MD; Laurent Givry, a Farr 400 sailor from Fairfax Station, VA; John Leitzinger, an Aerodyne 38 sailor from Tacoma. WA: Charles Schaffner, a I/105 sailor who races on Lake Erie: Chris Lewis, a J/44 sailor from Houston, TX; Glenn Doncaster, a Sabre 426 sailor from Raleigh, NC; and the home team of Thodore Papenthein, skipper of the US Naval Academy's offshore team, based in Annapolis, MD.

This is designed to be an amateur event, sailed by crews who normally sail together. All teams are a crew of seven, and entrants must prove that at least five of their crew members have recently competed together in a specified number of events. This was not a problem for Team Meat, as our Facebook pages and photo albums clearly demonstrate that we are together nearly 24 hours a day. An eighth crew member, a member of the Navy offshore varsity sailing team, was also provided to each team. Team Meat sailed with Brian Kennalley, Edward Mui, Val Smith, Brian Kaczor (owner of the T10 Erica), Brian Davies, Andy Camarda, and a six-months-pregnant Markell Smith. Fate made an appearance when it came time to draw for a Navy Midshipman to join the crew. Though a fourth Brian was not an option, we drew the next best thing: a Ryan. Ryan is an offshore skipper and tactician on one of the Navy team's boats, but was still enthusiastic about doing whatever was needed on our boat. He was an asset to the team, and it was a privilege to get to know him and the rest of the Naval Academy team. Markell was asked a few times how she

managed to be out on the spectator boat all day while pregnant. The rest of our crew always got a kick out of hearing peoples' reactions: "What?? You were RACING??"

The regatta was sailed in Navy 44s provided by the US Naval Academy. Rigs were tuned to be equal and bottoms were cleaned in advance; competitors weren't allowed to adjust the rig aside from backstay tension. Competitors rotated boats each day, bringing an assigned #1 genoa and two spinnakers along from boat to boat. It was an interesting boat to sail. The wheel had very little feel and was less responsive than a T10. The boat was obviously a lot longer, and about four times the weight of a T10. It has twelve (twelve!) winches, a big masthead genoa and symmetrical spinnaker, and requires dip-pole jibes. Who knew that was even a thing?

Conditions were challenging all weekend. Our team was especially nervous because the forecast was for significant current and very light wind. We tend to perform at our worst in light air, and don't know much about tides or currents. Luckily Val, our tactician, had good experience sailing in the Chesapeake and was able to make sound strategic calls all weekend about which bars to go to after racing. Ryan also provided some help with local knowledge and kept us off of the shoals. The Race Committee did a good job of running nine starts leading to six finishes in light, shifty breeze.

We arrived at the Naval Academy on Thursday. It was an impressive facility and it was a pleasure to sail there. We registered and went out for a tuneup sail and safety check with a safety officer. We had light air for our warmup, which was good preparation for the weekend. Our team stayed out as long as possible getting used to the boat and the dip-pole, but had to cut practice short and hustle to shore after a trimmer requested a beer and was informed by the safety officer that there was no beer on Naval Academy boats.

Friday began with a medium distance race in light, shifty breeze. Large wind shifts shuffled the pack significantly several times, and our team got a little lucky to make up a bunch of places and be in third place at the shortened finish. The Race Committee also attempted to run a buoy race after the distance race was finished. Our team was in a solid first place when the race had to be abandoned due to lack of wind, which had us feeling great about our first day's performance until we found out at the party that at least four or five other competitors also thought they were in a solid first place when that race was canceled...

Saturday morning we started with a second place finish in a well-sailed buoy race, followed by a long distance race. Our team was doing well



until getting held out by a number of starboard tack boats at the upwind, starboard-rounding turn mark. We fought back, sailing downwind at a high point of sail over many competitors. We watched the deck get shuffled around us a number of times by wind shifts, but from our position in the center of the course we always maintained a score of around fifth, which is where we finished. There was then another abandoned buoy race in which we were looking like podium finishers. We were happy to end the day in first by a slim one point margin.


Sunday was dedicated to buoy racing, which also meant it was dedicated to protests. We had a good first race, finishing in second, and a bad second race in which we struggled with boat speed, finishing in seventh. We were tied for first in the regatta going into the last race, but Val made the right calls, Andy had the boat speed issue solved, and the team continued to exhibit excellent boat handling, especially Davies on the bow with a knee injury suffered in the prior race. We moved into a slightly comfortable lead at 30 points, with three competitors tied behind us at 34. The Race Committee attempted to start a fourth race, but a strong ebbing tide and dying breeze made it evident to all that we wouldn't even be able to get across the starting line and the race was abandoned. We were national champions! And it was left to the judges to work out the day's many protests to determine the second and third place winners: Chris Lewis of Houston and Theodore Papenthien of the US Naval Academy.

It was an honor and a pleasure to represent the T10 Class, Chicago Corinthian Yacht Club, Lake Michigan, and Area K, and our team is thrilled to have represented them as well as we could have. The Lake Michigan Sail Racing Federation provided us with a Grant in Aid to help us with the regatta's substantial entry fee, for which we are very grateful. US Sailing and the Naval Academy put on a top-notch event, worthy of the "National Championship" moniker. Most of all, it was great fun meeting and sailing against talented racers from around the country. Thank you to all involved! And to those reading: Consider applying to attend this event in the future. You will truly enjoy it, as we did.

He takes great pride in ensuring maximum Sea Scout participation in a wide variety of events. Whenever there's an opportunity to have fun, he leads the charge by organizing the outing. In addition to numerous day sails on some of the 6 vessels operated by the Chicago Council's Sea Base at 31st St. Harbor, he has organized and participated in a Mackinaw return sail (Farr 40), led a Venetian Night Color Guard seen by thousands at Navy Pier, stepped off with the first flag at Chicago's America's participation in Bay Jammers, as well as organized overnights on submarines, camping, archery and pistol shooting outings.

One of his most recent projects has been to create a Ship's Store for out-of-state Sea Scouts. He is in the process of organizing a web site that invites other Ships to order uniforms from the Navy reclaim services in Great Lakes. He plans to gather Navy uniforms and make them available to other ships that don't have the opportunity to visit the area.

This fall Matthew organized a fund raising activity at Northwestern University's football stadium, where the Ship rents seat backs to football fans on game day. Matthew decided that the entire day's proceeds for the 8+hour event would be donated to the Hurricane Harvey relief effort. His team raised over \$500 for the Red Cross.

Matthew is an avid bag piper, frequently performing at local and regional ceremonies and competitions. He works part time at a local funeral home, and his immediate post high school plans include attending a city wide college and obtaining a license in mortuary sciences. His long range plans include continuing his desire to serve by obtaining a commission and becoming an officer in the US Navy.

JUDD GOLDMAN ADAPTIVE SAILING PROGRAM By Robert Lang

Chicago is home to unique, award-winning, learn-to-sail programs for both the physically disabled as well as for inner-city, at-risk youth. This year, the Judd Goldman Adaptive Sailing Program (JGASP) is celebrating its 28th season, with over 1,000 people annually experiencing the joy and thrill of sailing on Lake Michigan.

The family of the late Judd Goldman, a Chicago businessman and sailor who suffered from a disability, founded JGASP in Judd's memory in 1990. Beginning with three sailboats, the adaptive program fleet now numbers twenty boats in three classes in addition to several support/safety boats. The specially designed sailboats allow participants, no matter what their disability, the opportunity to "take the helm" rather than just being a passenger.

The Judd Goldman Adaptive Sailing Foundation (JGASF) is a public/private partnership with the Chicago Park District. The Foundation raises funds for instructor salaries, boats and maintenance costs while the Park District is responsible for the infrastructure. JGASF has a similar partnership arrangement with the City of Lake Forest, IL, establishing the Judd Goldman Adaptive Sailing Program, Lake Forest.

Our season began in early June with the 28th Annual Open House at the Judd Goldman Sailing Center, Burnham Park Harbor. Over 300 people attended the Open House. Those new to the Program met the instructors, familiarized themselves with the special adaptive equipment and took a short sail followed by a complimentary lunch.

Besides learn-to-sail lessons, JGASP provides seamanship classes, cruises, racing clinics and regattas. Movie nights at the Sailing Center with viewing under the stars has become a popular event. Those sailors with a competitive spirit participated in the Season Championship series, with races like Jackson Park Yacht Club's Freedom Cup and our 28th Annual Goldman



Cup. In the last few years, we've expanded our racing program and now have a traveling team sponsored by the John T. Jackson Foundation. This year our racing team members traveled to Clearwater and St. Petersburg, FL as well as to Newport, RI. Besides individuals, groups like the Shirley Ryan AbilityLab (RIC), Friedman Place and Schwab Rehabilitation Hospital participate in the disabled sailing program.

The 27th Annual JGASF Independence Gala was held on July 28th at the Galleria Marchetti. The event was partially underwritten by the Jerome Mirza Foundation and was attended by 400 supporters. The raffle and silent auction was incredible, featuring trips throughout the U.S. (including Hawaii), Caribbean islands, B.V.I.'s and more. Our emcee for the evening was Alex Maragos, NBC 5 Chicago. Barbara Galinska, who first took JGASP lessons as a child, was the guest speaker. Barbara captivated the crowd with her humorous childhood experiences at JGASP, explaining how JGASP has become so important to her while growing up in Chicago.

The Independence Cup (IC) for sailors with disabilities was held at the Judd Goldman Sailing Center on the same weekend as the Independence Gala. Singlehanded, doublehanded and triplehanded JGASP owned-boats were made available at no cost to the competitors,

helping to attract sailors from the U.S., Canada and even Sweden. Making it all possible were JGASF Travel Grants, a LMSRF Grant and generous sponsors like Hilton, who provided ADA accessible rooms at the Palmer House and Chicago Hilton, and Cook-Illinois Corp., who offered adaptive transportation throughout the weekend. Columbia Yacht Club graciously hosted a barbecue for the racers and volunteers. Former JGASP sailor, 2016 Paralympic Silver medalist and 2016 Gala guest speaker, Rick Doerr, was the winning triplehanded class skipper. JGASP sailors, Bridget Bodo and crew, Deborah Smith were second, while capturing third place was JGASP skipper Tony Sanpere. In the doublehanded class, JGASP sailors Gary Pierce and Patrick LoDuca finished in 3rd place. Barbara Galinska tied for third in the singlehanded class. The competitors attended the Judd Goldman Adaptive Sailing Foundation Independence Gala on Friday evening of the IC regatta weekend as guests of the JGASF.

In addition to the adaptive sailing program, the foundation supports the Judd Goldman Junior Sailing Program (JGJSP). This program teaches sailing to at-risk, inner-city youth from 8-12 years of age. Located in Humboldt, Garfield and now Columbus Park Lagoons, over 200 enthusiastic children take lessons each year in JGJSP pram sailboats. The concept is unique because it brings the program to the neighborhood rather than the neighborhood to the program. Like the adaptive program, the goal is to help develop self-esteem and independence.

We thank you for joining us in supporting this unique foundation that teaches the physically disabled as well as inner-city youth the sport of sailing.

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

THE CHICAGO CORINTHIAN YACHT CLUB

Chicago Corinthian Yacht Club is the city's most northerly yacht club and sits on the north side of Montrose Harbor, in the middle of Chicago's most popular and most beautiful parkland on the shore of the greatest place in the world to navigate a boat.

grass, the beach and its protected harbor. Toward the lake are the famous bird sanctuary and magic hedge renowned by birders and the most visited fishing area on the lakefront. So it has been since its establishment in 1934. As it was at its inception, Corinthian is an all-volunteer club operated by, and for, its members.

The Club serves sailors and power boaters, most of who live and work on the north side of the city and the close-in northern suburbs- boaters committed to their life on the Lake. Chicago Corinthian Yacht Club has been successfully working hard to increase its membership numbers in the several categories it offers. Our membership growth, and the revenue which comes with it, has allowed the Club to continue to improve our clubhouse, galley and the ability to provide a home base for power boaters, cruising sailboats and a first-class racing venue for its sail racing community with a comfortable setting easy to reach with plenty of parking.

Stewardship of the Club rests with its Board.

The Board has directly confronted the modern boater's world of declining membership numbers and shrinking revenue by offering programs calculated to reach people curious about boating, educate them and, by this, increase participation. **Junior sailors** are the Club's next members and Corinthian has improved its junior program with the hiring of new instructors and a dynamic, parent-driven administration.

Following the theme of educational opportunities Club members are proud of our well-known **Crew School**. Each spring in April and May adults 18 years old and up learn the basics of boats, weather, sailing and safety and are matched with skippers from the various sailboat fleets as they further their interest in learning to sail. For the first time, 2017 was the year when Corinthian volunteers started our Adult Sailing **Program.** A long awaited project, the program is an on-the-water set of sailing lessons in the school's Rhodes 19 sailboat. Begun as an experiment, the sailing school soon filled available slots such that more sessions were added to serve the numbers of people wanting to take lessons. Chicago Corinthian Yacht Club has recognized the growth of shared use and ownership plans as a new method in the use of boats. The Club has developed a strong relationship with the Montrose Harbor franchisee of Freedom Boat **Club**, a national club which offers members the use of power and sail boats. Corinthian has been able to offer a place for FBC's members to socialize and FBC has been a source of new membership for the Club and the Adult Sailing Program. The students from the Crew School and from the Adult Sailing Program help grow the Club and the sport of sailing all over the City.

Educational offerings include the well-attended Winter Lecture Series put on in conjunction with the Chicago T-10 Association and the significant Laser clinic put on by that fleet and which features Olympic-class instruction in a master class setting. As well, the Club becomes classroom as it opens its doors to the Chicago Park District in the District's Nature Along the Lake and fishing instruction programs. The Park District has designed them to bring kids with little experience with Lake Michigan to the shore and explore Chicago's greatest asset- the series of parks along Lake Michigan.

Our **power fleet** is active and busy. The power fleet is the engine of much of the Club's social activities. It either sponsors many of the holiday parties at the Club or is involved with staffing and organizing parties sponsored by other fleets. Fish This! attracts fisherman from all over the city to participate in the Club's annual fishing tournament in July. The power boaters also put on an annual golf outing at the Park District's neighboring Sydney Marovitz Golf Course, the College Tailgate Party, the Kentucky Derby party, a Chili Cook-off and that engineer's delight, the Cardboard Regatta which features invention vs. immersion.

Chicago Corinthian Yacht Club remains a strong exponent of sail boat racing. The Club runs more Chicago Area Sail Racing Association interclub races than any other Club in the organization. On its own racing circle, just offshore of Montrose Point, the Club holds races for the Rhodes 19 fleet, the Offshore fleet, the Vanguard fleet and the Laser Fleet including Wednesday evening's Beer Can series, Thursday nights for the Vanguards and the Weekend Series for the Rhodes and Offshore fleets. The Club was proud to have organized major regattas this year including the Tartan Ten North Americans, the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Offshore Regatta, sailed in T-10s, and the Red Flannels Regatta which draws dinghy racers from all over the Midwest.

Corinthians have fun off the water, as well. In the Club, on **Friday nights**, the crowd enjoys either Comedy Night, movies on the lawn or Trivia and Karaoke Night. Monthly **Sundays** include Bingo and Bloody Mary brunches. The bar is always open for Cubs, Bears and Sox games. From Wednesday night through Sunday dinner, the galley is open during the season. Operated by the proprietors of Drews on Halsted, the Club has been able to offer members terrific food served in front of its million dollar view. The Club, itself, is always open to members.

Every activity offered by Chicago Corinthian Yacht Club is grounded on the fact that that we are a volunteer based boating Club. The members guide, develop, manage, grow and preserve the Club over the years. We exist to provide a home to boaters in Chicago, educate those becoming involved in the sport and to be good neighbors to Chicagoans who live and work in the surrounding neighborhood. **Please come** to our Club. Locals snatch victory in final leg at M32 North Americans. Chicago thrills as future host of the 2018 M32 world championship

The M32 Catamarans put on quite a performance at the inaugural North America Championship, September 23-24, with eleven teams ripping around Lake Michigan completing 14 races with eight different race winners.

"It is easily the most fun, per foot of length, of any boat out there that I'm aware of right now", said Rick DeVos, skipper of Rev Racing. "

"It's just pure fun on the water and I tell that to everybody, it's literally the most fun I've had sailing ever."

The regatta served as the "test event" for the 2018 World Championship, to be held September 19-22 in Chicago, and the "windy city" delivered.

Determining the M32 North America Champion came down to the last race with REV skippered by Rick DeVos going into the final race with a two-point advantage over local favorite, Convexity Racing skippered by Don Wilson.

While REV kept it close enough to maintain the lead at the first reach & leeward gate, Convexity managed to stick a covering tack on the upwind that put REV back in the fleet and ultimately resulted in a regatta win by one point.

"The start has a huge impact on the whole thing, but especially in these lighter airs everybody is so close to the line there is just no margin for error", said Wilson.

"It was super tough, super tight racing and that's certainly a good sign for the class. We were hoping to win but knew it would be very tough. Yesterday we had some bad races so to come back from that and ultimately win feels really good." Reflecting on the hard fought battle, DeVos was thrilled with the level of competition all weekend.

"We were hoping to hold off Convexity but in the last race we just couldn't. It's really good racing out there; everybody saw a good result throughout the event, which is testament to this class growing talent. I love this city. I'm from Michigan, just across the lake, so anytime I can get down here and spend time on the M32 is just fantastic."

Continuing through the results, The Magenta Project skippered by Midwest local Sally Barkow posted consistent mid-fleet results throughout the event including three back-to-back wins on the first day, but with other competition so strong ended the regatta in third.

Newcomer to the M32 fleet, Extreme2's Dan Cheresh fought a tight mid-fleet battle with Ryan DeVos of XS Energy, ending the event on even points with the final race being the decider on countback and Cheresh just taking it.

Cheresh was exemplary of the type of owner/ driver the M32 North American fleet has attracted, showcased by the nine Corinthian and two professional teams this weekend. Nearly every team included some level of America's Cup or World Match Racing Tour professional talent sailing with the teams.

A combination of professional coaching, daily meetings with umpires, and a robust event management showcased a fleet that continues to grow worldwide.

Taking place just one week before the 2017 Chicago Match Cup, World Match Racing Tour stopover, James Prendergast, skipper of Grave Digger, reflected on the ease at which amateur teams had access to professional skillsets.

"It's great to have this event scheduled right next to the Tour to draw all this talent", said Prendergast.

"We've had great sailing, great competition and learned a bunch. These guys are the top sailors in the world, and not only you get to sail against and with them but you get to become friends with them as well. The platform is amazing because it is fantastic sailing against fantastic sailors who you get to take a beer with in the bar afterwards and if nothing else, just pick their brains on tuning tips and tactics on the course."

America's Cup sailor, Matt Cassidy, who raced for ORACLE TEAM USA, echoed the same sentiment regarding the pro-am element to the class.

"These are high performance boats and the skills to sail them well are so transferrable", said Cassidy.

"The simplicity in the design makes them easy to just jump on and perform well in. With a couple of good sailors onboard, you can easily build up a team of less experience and be competitive."

Looking ahead, the 2018 M32 World Championship next summer expects to see 20+ boats on the starting line and if this year's close racing, perfect conditions and faultless hospitality are anything to go by then the event will be spectacular.

Who will be the favorite? Knowing the rising level of talent, Don Wilson concluded, "This is definitely a good starting place but it's going take a hell of a lot of work to pull it off, and probably a little luck as well."



Many will remember Ed introducing himself at Chicago Yachting Association monthly meetings as **Temporary Commodore of the Sea Scouts**. And that is how he started his long affiliation with Sea Scouts. After joining the **Columbian Yacht Club in 1937**, Ed became the first skipper of their

flotilla of 8 young men in 1940 on a temporary basis. Along the way he has served as an officer and board member of the **Chicago Area Council, BSA** (now Pathway to Adventure Council) and **National Council board member**, along with many other jobs. He holds several awards for his service to youth in our Chicagoland area including a **"Lifetime Achievement Award" from the Boy Scouts of America**.

Ed has served in many capacities with the **Columbia Yacht Club** from committee membership, chair and board of director and as their Commodore from 1966 through 1969 and also 1981. He has also served on the board of **Chicago Yachting Association** and became Commodore from 1970 through 1971. In 1989 he was recognized as **Yachtsman of the Year**. He has also been a member of **Chicago Yacht Club** since 1972.

Ed was drafted during World War II and maintained a fleet of new sailboats in New York's Finger Lakes for recovering injured officers.

JUNIOR RACE WEEK CHICAGO YACHT CLUB











Last fall, Chicago's five premier yacht clubs formed the Chicago Area Sail Racing Association (CASRA). Designed to organize and grow sail racing in Chicago, CASRA, while largely aimed at adult racers, also recognizes that sailing's future lies in today's youth sailors, who will be tomorrow's boat owners and crew.

To encourage and extend junior sailing, these 5 clubs, CASRA and the Chicago Park District's Sailing Programs, which operates all of the City of Chicago's youth sailing programs, organized and hosted the inaugural Chicago Junior Race Week (CJRW).

From Friday June 30th through Sunday July 2nd, youth sailors from 7 to 18 came to Chicago for three days of highcaliber racing on Chicago's beautiful lakefront. 125 boats registered for this inaugural regatta, including teams from Chicago, Michigan, Wisconsin, and from as far away as New York, Colorado, Maryland and the US Virgin Islands.

In cooperation with the Sheridan Shores Sailing Schools, the event kicked off with the "Mini-Mac" - an 8nm distance race for Optimists, Lasers and C420s from Wilmette Harbor to just off of Chicago's Belmont and Montrose Harbors. This distance race exposed many youth sailors to distance racing strategy and tactics for the first time. in Following the Mini-Mac, on July 1 and 2, youth racers in Optimists, C420s, 420s and Lasers, as well as 'Beginning Racers' (who were attending their first regatta) enjoyed two days of highcaliber, fun fleet racing in Chicago.

The Optimist sailors raced out of Chicago Corinthian Yacht Club in Montrose Harbor, while C420s, 420s and Lasers raced out of Chicago Yacht Club's Belmont Station in Belmont Harbor. The beginner, or Green Fleet, raced out of Jackson Park Yacht Club in Jackson Park Harbor. On Saturday night the racers enjoyed a BBQ picnic at Chicago Yacht Club's Belmont Station. At the awards ceremony on Sunday winners of Mini Mac were Chris Sharpless (C420) and Claire Considine (Laser Radial) and for fleet racing winners included Peter Barnard (Opti – Gold Fleet), Phena Fischer-Klumb (Opti – Silver Fleet), Sam Childers (420), Robert Hunter (C420), and Claire Considine (Laser Radial).

Chicago Junior Race Week is emblematic of the commitment of the five clubs that make up CASRA to foster and promote growth of the sail racing sport. By jointly organizing this event, the Clubs can collaborate to host a world-class event for the children in their programs and others around the region and across the country (and beyond). By expanding the traditional youth regatta format into new directions - a distance race and racing for 'never-ever' sailors many of whom are not even yet ready for an Optimist Green Fleet the Clubs are working to share the excitement and passion of their members for the sport of sailboat racing in all aspects.

By offering fun, competitive racing in a world-class city, the five clubs comprising CASRA provided a great experience for youth sailors, helping them to develop a life-long passion for the sport.



With a new boat and a revved up recruiting effort, and with continued support of Columbia Yacht Club, Sea Scout Ship Challenge #5111 is on course for service to the nautical community and the maritime region. This

summer the Scouts renamed their new vessel the Edward B Stein in honor of four-time past Commodore of Columbia who, at 100 years of age, can still turn out on deck. He remains the oldest active sailor in the Chicago area, and Commodore Emeritus of Chicago Sea Scouting with 60 years of service.

At a ceremony in July, Mr. Stein was on hand at the Columbia docks as Sea Scouts and adult leaders, sharply dressed in their summer whites, served as honor guard, as Ed's daughter broke a bottle of champagne on the bow of the newlynamed vessel.

Thanks to a generous donation from Jim Richter and Randy Kuhn, the C&C 39, formerly Cheep N Deep, will be the new floating station for the Ship Challenge, its coed teen-aged youth training weekly during the season. The focus is first on safety, then fun and self-confidence. They are learning for life.

The emphasis of Sea Scouting on leadership, seamanship, citizenship and sportsmanship has led several members of Ship 5111 to careers in the maritime professions. Peter Bied is near graduation from the U.S. Coast Guard Academy as a commissioned midshipman. Jared Gorzen has shipped off aboard a USCG Cutter to the Guam station as a machinist. Alex Zoiopoulos has earned his master's license and currently works as a Captain on the Anita D. charter boats in Chicago.

These are just a few of the success stories of the Sea Scouts as they prepare young people with

life skills, ones that are recognized by colleges, and by companies looking to hire the best and the brightest.

After a few seasons without a dedicated vessel, Ship 5111 again has a sailboat in their home waters of Monroe Harbor, from which they can continue the big boat sailing, racing and long cruise program they established twelve years ago. Enthusiasm grew this spring as the boat was launched and sailing began. New scouts and adult leaders came on board, including the addition of Diane Karpman, an experienced sailor who brought enthusiasm and energy to the program.

Ship 5111 will continue its tradition of public service efforts around the Lake Michigan region, including its well-known Christmas Tree Ship project.



"We host an overnight on the Columbia Yacht Club ship for hundreds of Scouts and leaders who then help unload the Coast Guard Cutter bringing Christmas trees to Chicago," said Skipper Marty Bernstein, leader of the Ship. "Those trees, are loaded onto trucks to be distributed along with decorations, winter clothing and toys, by faith-based organizations for needy families in the Chicago area to help them have a Christmas celebration."

The experience is not only rewarding for the Scouts, it provides them with a social evening of fun, food and music on the Columbia Yacht Club ship to kick off the holidays. Other service



projects have included building a wooden fence enclosure at the Big Sable Lighthouse in Ludington, Mich., maintenance on the USS Cobia, a WWII submarine in Manitowoc, WI and annual service days to Columbia Yacht Club.

Ship 5111 is part of Chicago's Pathway to Adventure Council of the Boy Scouts of America and is one of several Ships in the area. A Ship is the nautical equivalent of a Boy Scout Troop, although not all Ships have a vessel. The current Ship Challenge #5111 was started in 2001 by Columbia Yacht Club members and officers, including then Commodore Gary Hooper and current Vice Commodore Scott Johnson.

The first vessel was Marlin, a Cal 40; followed by Live Wire, a Dobroth 42; and then Nautilus, a Tripp 47 which launched the Scouts into big-boat racing mode. The Tripp 47 also was chartered to syndicates for the Chicago to Mackinac Race, providing funds for mooring, maintenance and storage. Scouts were selected as crew based on their sailing abilities and maturity. They were then joined by other members and leaders for the return delivery to Chicago, a fiveday harbor-hopping long cruise.

With a new vessel, new recruits and renewed enthusiasm, Ship 5111 will be a valuable addition to the Chicago sailing community and to Columbia Yacht Club. The distinctive red hull and mast of the Edward B. Stein will be a signal to all that the Sea Scouts in Monroe Harbor are again underway.



Chicago's Midwest Open Racing Fleet (MORF), in its 59th season, is an all-volunteer organization of members donating their time to organize fun-competitive racing and social programs. The racing model is one fee per season, just show up and race, in a PHRF fleet with boats rating from 48 to 200+. The average PHRF rating is just over 100 and dropping by 4 points each year as the MORF fleet gets faster. There are divisions for jib and main, spinnaker and multihulls. Unlike racing nationwide, MORF membership and participation has been stable over the last 6 seasons with a fleet of 50+ boats and 400 participants in the 36 MORF run races each season. MORF also participates in the Wednesday night beer races with about one third of all racers scored in MORF in addition to their yacht clubs.

The eight race MORF Long Distance Series was run this season largely together with CASRA and other Area III clubs. MORF ran races around a loMORF MIDWEST OPEN RACING FLEET

cal 20 mile course and to and from Waukegan, St Joseph, and Michigan City. In addition, MORF created a Race to Mackinac trophy for its members since we have a large contingent of Mac racers in our fleet. All races are dual scored for CASRA/ Area III and MORF. The result is a larger fleet and more competition for everyone. MORF has continued their relationship with Columbia Yacht Club as well as other CASRA and Area III clubs.

The eight race Lady Skipper Series finished in early September. These races require a woman at the helm from warning to finish. Several boats have raced in this series, and more are welcome. This series has become extremely competitive and is included as a qualifier for the season championship Commodore's Cup in late September.

MORF always has a racing frenzy throughout the month of September. The MORF Commodore's Cup, a three race regatta, has its qualifiers determined in the last races in early September. The MORF Open, our traditional season ending threerace weekend and party for all MORF and Chicago area racers was held September 23-24. The weather was great and the competition fierce. It was a great way to round out the season! We are already planning MORF's 60th season.

CHICAGO PREPARES FOR THE NORTH AMERICAN PREDICTED LOG CHAMPIONSHIP

Chicago will host the North American Predicted Log Championship in 2019. The championship brings together the best predicted loggers in the country. In 2016, the championship was hosted by Port Orchard Yacht Club in Seattle, Washington. Nine yacht clubs were invited to participate with John Vignocchi representing Chicago.

To prepare for the honor of hosting the North American Championship, Chicago Yacht Club held 5 Predicted Log contests this summer. Predicted Log is a powerboat competition that tests the accuracy of prediction as opposed to speed. It features multi-leg courses of 15 to 20 miles in length utilizing stationary marks in the water, typically objects that are already in place. The contests this year featured many unusual marks, including such objects as the dome on the Adler Planetarium and the Morgan Shoal Buoy.

Boaters who participate in P-Log, as it is called, learn a great deal about their vessels. The contest is run with only the use of a tach and compass. Predicting speed based on these minimal instruments requires an understanding of wind, current, other boat traffic, and most importantly how your boat responds in all conditions.

All contests are open to all powerboaters in the Chicago area. Boaters of all skill levels are welcome. You will sharpen your navigation skills, gain better understanding of your boat performance and meet new friends. There is a training seminar before the beginning of each boating season. Please consider joining in this fun and rewarding competition.

Chicago's Christmas Ship is Chicago's largest

all volunteer charitable support program for inner city youth and their families at Christmas time. Over the last decade and a half, Chicago's Christmas Ship, a consortium of organizations that includes the Chicago Council the of Navy League of the United States, Chicago Marine Heritage Society, Chicago Yachting Association, International United States Shipmasters Association, Coast Guard, and United States Coast Guard Auxiliary has distributed over 19,000 trees to deserving families living in under served communities throughout the City of Chicago. Chicago's Christmas Ship Committee raises funds and organizes the event that takes place the first weekend in December at Navy Pier.

The event is a modern-day re-enactment of the annual arrival of the Christmas Tree Ship – the Rouse Simmons – that took place in the waning days of the age of sail on Lake Michigan. Learn From Lucas' Story

AVOID WATER RECREATION TRAGEDY By Molly M. Hall

Like millions of water recreation Lucas never regained consciousness. enthusiasts, Kevin and Sheryl Ritz always made sure their kids wore life jackets and were supervised in and out of the water. So the tragedy of that hot August day years ago was unimaginable.

Eight-year-old Lucas was with his brother and friends swimming at a marina. With a large inner tube, the kids were floating in the channel, letting the current carry

them to the end of the dock. Sheryl was walking down the dock to keep an eye on them when Lucas decided to get out mid-way.

She recalls, "I saw that he was heading to the dock to get out of the water. Then

all of a sudden he screamed and rolled (back) on his life jacket. I yelled for help...then jumped in to help him, and immediately I felt like I couldn't move." Kevin ran to the scene as they were being pulled out.

The coroner ruled his death a drowning.

However, Kevin insisted on investigating further, which led to the discovery that a boat docked where Lucas was heading was leaking 120 volts of electricity into the water. Lucas was killed as he entered the energized water, and Sheryl had been paralyzed when she jumped in to help.



Lucas' family has learned that these kinds of accidents kill people every year, and they are working with the Safe Electricity program to raise awareness of what is called "electric shock drowning" or ESD.

The Ritz family and Safe Electricity urge water recreation lovers to heed these precautions:

Do not swim around docks with electrical equipment or boats plugged into shore power.

If you are on the shore or dock when a swimmer feels an electrical current, do not jump in. Throw them a float, and try to find the electrical breaker to shut off the power as quickl;y as you can.

Have propoer ground fault and safety equipment installed on power sources for docks and boats with alternating current (AC) electrical systems.
